Forest Farming Workshop Puts Integrated Options in Focus

Courtenay, in the heart of Vancouver Island, was host to a workshop on October 16th, highlighting the opportunities and challenges of advancing the forest farming of berry crops. Forest farming is the intentional integrated management of a forest to produce a non-timber crop in conjunction with silvicultural activity such as thinning and harvesting. This latest workshop in a series of regional workshops sponsored by the BC Agroforestry Industry Development Initiative was designed to serve a growing interest in emerging production and product development opportunities from native shrub crops. It focused on accessing niche markets for specialty foods and natural health products from 'wild' berries. Workshop participants were provided a balance of practical information on production methods, harvesting and processing technology, product development and marketing with a focus on good

agricultural practices, quality and safety procedures. Four themes emerged and form a focus for development to advance forest farming in BC.

1) There is strong consumer interest in berry products highlighting the opportunity for industry growth. Challenges relate to obtaining planting stock, propagating native species and optimizing production in forested systems. Managing labour costs is also vital to enterprise success, as that is the single largest expense in a berry production enterprise.

2) Product quality and safety assurances are needed to access and maintain markets. Good agricultural practices involve a systemized approach to assessing risks, worker training and supervision and good record keeping at all stages of production.

3) Land access is a very important issue on Vancouver Island given the high proportion of land held by the Crown

and in large private land holdings. Agroforestry production can have an important role in 'wild' berry production, as an option to take pressure off increasingly overused wild harvest sites, and as a means to integrate production and conservation practices.

4) Detailed information on production methods and markets are often lacking and are a key barrier for new industry entrants. In order for the industry to develop, better access is needed to existing information as well as new research and development on forest farming methods.

Shop the Wild 2008

Shop the Wild 2008 was a tremendous success and a fun-filled weekend for everyone who came out to Royal Roads University to learn more about BC's wild products sector. The public were welcomed to the festival by the toe-tapping fiddling of 'The Twisted String' and the younger crowd revelled in the forest fairy-themed face painting. The "Urban Beekeeping" presentation by John Defayette created a huge buzz for city folks interested in setting up hives in their backyards and Andy MacKinnon's presentation of "The Ethnobotany of Sasquatch" was standing room only. An estimated 2,000 people visited the 40 exhibitors over the two days of the festival.

Exhibitors loved the ambiance of the indoor festival and commented on the positive energy of the crowds who came out to see the rich variety of products coming from BC's forests and farmlands. As one attendee stated: *"It was one of the best markets that I have been to...a great opportunity to see the diversity of wild products and learn more!"*

Vancouver Islanders had been anticipating this once-a-year event and came to stock up on wild foods, natural products and to find unique gifts for friends and family. According to a survey of participants at the event, over 80% had purchased a wild product or service in the past year, and 78% purchase local products on a weekly basis.

Even more telling, is that 80% of the consumers surveyed reported to have both purchased wild products in the past year and had shopped at a

farmers' market. Of those, 57% shopped at farmers markets 10 or more times this past year. This indicates a niche consumer segment ready to explore new products from the wild and agroforestry sector. These consumers are already aware of the benefits of buying local – health, economic, environmental and social. Additional results of this consumer survey will soon be available on the...
